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WAHO commends Nigerian government for its robust response to Mpox outbreak - January 2025



The West African Health Organization (WAHO) expresses its appreciation to Nigeria for its effective management of the Mpox outbreak in 2024. The assessment highlighted the proactive measures taken by the government, including the rapid deployment of response teams, enhanced surveillance and access to vaccines. By the end of 2024, there were 1,484 suspected cases and 124 confirmed cases in 28 states...

WAHO on a supervision mission in Ivory Coast for the fight against Mpox - January 2025



The West African Health Organization (WAHO) carried out a supervision mission in Côte d'Ivoire at the end of January 2025 to assess progress in the fight against Mpox. This visit made it possible to note the progress of response activities, the use of funding granted to strengthen prevention and treatment efforts in the country, which has recorded 109 cases spread across 35 health districts since July 2024.

WAHO, a strategic and financial partner of the Ivorian Ministry of Health, was received at the Public Health Emergency Operations Center (COUSP) of the National Institute of Public Hygiene (INHP) in Treichville. During this meeting, Professor EKRA Kouadio Daniel, Director General of INHP, reassured the delegation led by Dr. Malick Coulibaly on the proper implementation of activities according to the response plan developed and adopted, thus demonstrating the effective collaboration between WAHO and national institutions in the management of this epidemic in West Africa.

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Assessment mission of ECOWAS member countries on preparedness and response to the Mpox epidemic - Bissau, from 10 to 14 February 2025



The West African Health Organization (WAHO) conducted a monitoring mission to Guinea-Bissau from 10 to 14 February 2025 to assess the implementation of the Mpox Fund. This mission involved experts who conducted field visits and strategic meetings with national health authorities, ECOWAS, WHO and the chair of the steering committee. The visits covered key institutions such as the Ministry of Health, the National Institute of Public Health, hospitals (including the Military Hospital and the Cumurá Hospital), the Molecular Biology Laboratory and the health control system at the Osvaldo Vieira International Airport. This mission reflects WAHO's commitment to strengthening the capacities of ECOWAS member countries to respond to health emergencies, with a comprehensive report that will guide future regional actions against epidemics.









Liberia-Côte d'Ivoire Cross-Border Bilateral Meeting on Monkey Pox - San Pedro, February 11-13, 2025



The West African Health Organization (WAHO) organized a bilateral cross-border meeting between Liberia and Côte d'Ivoire in San Pedro from 11 to 13 February 2025. This joint initiative with the Ministries of Health and National Public Health Institutes of both countries demonstrates the regional commitment to strengthen health security and improve the response to monkeypox in West Africa.



Ghana-Côte d'Ivoire Cross-Border Meeting on Monkeypox Outbreak - Takoradi, February 19-21, 2025



The West African Health Organization (WAHO) organized a cross-border meeting between Ghana and Côte d'Ivoire to coordinate the fight against the monkeypox outbreak. This initiative brought together various key stakeholders: health authorities, border officials, customs, security officials, animal health specialists, opinion leaders and technical and financial partners.

This meeting illustrates WAHO's multi-sectoral and collaborative approach to strengthening disease surveillance and improving outbreak response in West Africa. The objectives were to intensify cross-border collaboration, optimize the public health response to monkeypox and other infectious diseases, and develop an action plan for sustainable cross-border health security, confirming WAHO's central role in regional public health coordination.

WAHO IN THE SPOTLIGHT



THE WEST AFRICAN HEALTH ORGANIZATION: A STRATEGIC PLAYER IN THE MANAGEMENT OF HEALTH CRISES

The West African Health Organization (WAHO), a specialized agency of the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS), asserts itself as an essential pillar in the coordination and support of health initiatives across its 12 Member States, particularly in times of crisis. Its fundamental mission - to protect the health of the populations of West Africa - is structured around the harmonization of policies, the pooling of resources and enhanced cooperation between Member States.

The WAHO intervention framework in crisis situations

Faced with regional health challenges, WAHO has developed a structured intervention framework based on five major axes:

- 1. Regional coordination: WAHO acts as a regional nerve center, aligning national health responses with technical support and adapted resources.
- 2. Rapid deployment: The organization facilitates immediate interventions, including the deployment of experts and medical supplies, often in collaboration with partners such as the World Health Organization (WHO) or the Africa Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (Africa CDC).
- 3. Capacity building: WAHO works to strengthen health systems, before and after crises, through training and infrastructure support.
- 4. Surveillance and preparedness: The organization supports disease surveillance networks for early detection and rapid response to outbreaks.
- 5. Resource mobilization: WAHO relies on the political mandate of ECOWAS to secure funding and assistance from international partners.

Major interventions and lessons learned

Over the years, WAHO has demonstrated its adaptability and leadership in several major health crises:

- Ebola outbreak (2014-2016): WAHO played a central role in coordinating the
 regional response, particularly in Guinea, Liberia and Sierra Leone. This crisis
 highlighted the need for more robust regional surveillance systems, leading to
 the establishment of the ECOWAS Regional Centre for Disease Surveillance and
 Control (RCDSC).
- COVID-19 pandemic (2020-present): WAHO led efforts for evidence-based decision-making, organizing regional workshops on diagnostics, surveillance and outbreak simulation exercises. It also distributed essential medical supplies and supported the development of guidance notes for Member States. This period demonstrated WAHO's ability to adapt quickly, while exposing funding and logistical challenges, particularly in reaching rural areas.
- Recurrent outbreaks (e.g. Lassa fever, Cholera): WAHO responded to frequent outbreaks of diseases such as Lassa fever and cholera by providing technical support and advocating for improved water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH) policies. A key lesson was the persistence of weaknesses in the preparedness of national health systems, which WAHO seeks to address through long-term capacity building.

Major interventions and lessons learned

Mpox outbreak (2024-2025): In the context of the recent Mpox outbreak, WAHO
was involved in the regional response, including supporting ECOWAS countries
with \$100,000 per country. Its work with WHO and Africa CDC to distribute
vaccines and strengthen laboratory capacity illustrates its growing role in
planning for vaccine deployment.

Strengths and challenges

- Strengths: WAHO's regional authority allows it to transcend linguistic and political divisions (Anglophone, Francophone, Lusophone states), and its partnerships amplify its reach. Its emphasis on simulation exercises and training has strengthened frontline preparedness.
- Outlook for improvement: WAHO is actively working to strengthen its financing mechanisms to ensure an efficient response to the health needs of ECOWAS populations. The organization is also engaging in strategic partnership with Member States to jointly develop national health infrastructure, learning from past experiences such as Ebola and COVID-19 to build more resilient systems.









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
